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CHARTER

The Election Funding Authority is established pursuant to the provisions of the Election Funding Act 1981. This Act is designed to achieve two major purposes, viz. to prescribe a scheme of public funding of election campaigns and to provide for the public disclosure of the sources of funds used and expenditure incurred in election campaigns. The Act also provides for the annual payment to eligible parties of amounts from the Political Education Fund.

Section 22(2) of the Act imposes a duty on the Authority to exercise its functions in a manner that is not biased against or in favour of any particular party, group, candidate or other person, body or organisation.

AIMS & OBJECTIVES

The Authority is responsible for dealing with:

- (a) applications by groups and candidates for registration;
- (b) claims by parties, groups and candidates for payment of election campaign expenditure in respect of Parliamentary elections;
- (c) declarations by parties, groups, candidates and third parties of political contributions received and electoral expenditure incurred in respect of Parliamentary and Local Government elections; and
- (d) claims by parties for payment from the Political Education Fund.

The Authority has a number of other responsibilities including a research role in relation to election funding, political contributions, electoral expenditure and other matters relating to the Act.

MANAGEMENT & STRUCTURE

Part II of the Election Funding Act 1981 provides that the Authority shall consist of:

- (a) The Electoral Commissioner for New South Wales as Chairperson;
- (b) A member appointed on the nomination of the Premier; and
- (c) A member appointed on the nomination of the Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Assembly.

SUMMARY REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

General

During the year the Authority registered candidates and groups contesting the Local Government general election held on 27 March 2004 conducted under the provisions of the Local Government Act 1993 and which involved a record number of candidates.

Some declarations of political contributions received and electoral expenditure incurred lodged by candidates, groups and parties contesting the Local Government general election were received before the end of the year.

Claims for payment from the Political Education Fund lodged by eligible parties were considered and appropriate payments made.

The Authority takes the opportunity to again express its appreciation to the staff of the State Electoral Office for their assistance and support.

2003 General Election

During the reporting period the Authority dealt with claims for payment and declarations of political contributions received and electoral expenditure incurred lodged by parties, groups and candidates contesting the General Election held on 22 March 2003.

The following number of parties, groups and candidates contested the election:-

The amounts available for distribution in accordance with the provisions of the Act were:-

Central Fund	\$ 6,915,113
Constituency Fund	\$ 3,457,556
Total	\$10,372,669

A total of \$10,372,669 was available for distribution to eligible parties, group and candidates contesting the election. Of this amount two-thirds (\$6,915,113) comprises the Central Fund from which eligible parties, groups and candidates contesting the Legislative Council election are paid. The balance (\$3,457,556) comprises the Constituency Fund from which eligible candidates contesting the Legislative Assembly elections are paid. The amount available for payment in each district is calculated by dividing the Constituency Fund by the number of electoral districts (93). The amount for each district would be $$3,457,556 \div 93 = $37,178$.

The Central Fund is payable to parties dependent upon the number of votes groups endorsed by a party receives at Legislative Council election although no party is entitled to receive more than 50% of the Fund.

The Constituency Fund is divided equally amongst the 93 Legislative Assembly districts and is payable to eligible candidates dependent upon number of votes received. No candidate is entitled to receive more than half the amount available for the district i.e. $37,178 \div 2 = 18,589$.

All parties contesting the election were registered under Part 4A of the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections Act 1912 for the purposes of the Election Funding Act.

Schedule "D" sets out a summary of political contributions received and electoral expenditure incurred by candidates at the 2003 Legislative Assembly election.

Schedule "E" sets out details of political contributions of more than \$1,500 received by parties that endorsed a group at the 2003 Legislative Council election. Also shown are details of political contributions of more than \$200 received by independent candidates.

Schedule "F" sets out details of political contributions of more than \$200 received by candidates at the 2003 Legislative Assembly election.

Matters Arising out of the Examination of Claims and Declarations

Parties, groups and candidates generally complied with the requirements of the Act although there continued to be occasions where additional details had to be sought.

However, the receipt of third party returns has presented some difficulties and this needs to be addressed at future elections.

Overall, those involved in the electoral process seem to be increasingly more aware of the requirements of the Act and this might well be attributable to the instructional material prepared by the Authority. Nonetheless, this latter aspect needs to be the subject to constant review in the light of matters coming to notice during examination of declarations and comments made by stakeholders.

Third Parties

Under the Act a third party is:-

- a person or organisation who incurs political expenditure of more than \$1,500 by way of a donation to a party or candidate;
- (b) a person or organisation which incurs political expenditure to this amount by way of playing an active role in the political process other than by direct donations to a party or candidate.

A third party is required to lodge a declaration setting out details of the expenditure together with the identity of any person or organisation who contributed more than \$1,000 which was used to incur the expenditure.

An examination has been made of the declarations of political contributions received to identify third parties who donated more than \$1,500 to a party or candidate at the 2003 State general election.

Declarations required under the Act have been received from most of the organisations or persons. Action is being taken with a view to the institution of proceedings against those organisations and persons who have failed to lodge the necessary declaration.

Third party declarations are available for inspection at the office of the Authority.

Local Government Elections

2004 Local Government General Election

Some 142 Councils held elections contested by a record number of 4962 candidates for the Local Government General Election held on 27 March 2004. Elections were deferred for 17 Councils pending finalisation of amalgamation proposals. (By comparison, in 1999 some 152 of 174 councils held elections and involved 4,552 candidates.)

In addition, 6 council areas, Conargo (4 wards), Coolamon, Dungog (3 wards), Narromine, Quirindi and Warren (4 wards) had uncontested elections as the number of candidates nominating was the same as the number to be elected. A further 27 wards over 19 councils were uncontested.

At the close of the reporting period only a few declarations and claims had been lodged with the Authority. The last day for lodgement of documents was 26 July 2004. In order to provide a complete record of the 2004 Local Government General Election details of all documents lodged will be included in the next Annual Report.

Documents lodged are available for inspection once they have been dealt with by the Authority.

Copies of all declarations lodged are available for inspection at the Authority or at the office of the relevant Council.

By virtue of section 6(a) of the Election Funding Act the Electoral Commissioner is Chairperson of the Authority. The Electoral Commissioner's office is included in the Public Office Holder Group listed under section 11A of the Statutory and Other Office Remuneration Act 1975.

For the period 1 July 2003 to 11 January 2004, the Chairperson was John Wasson, who as Electoral Commissioner received a total remuneration package of \$214,260 (for the period 12 January to 30 June 2004 Brian DeCelis was the acting Chairperson). The Chairperson did not receive any payments in addition to his remuneration.

The total number of senior executive positions in the Authority during the reporting year was one. No female filled the position during this period.

CODE OF CONDUCT

The Code of Conduct is set out in the Annual Report of the State Electoral Office.

CONSULTANTS

The Authority did not use the services of consultants during the reporting period.

CONTRACT & MARKET TESTING

Internal auditing of the State Electoral Office extends to the records of the Authority. This function is contracted out and for the reporting period the cost to the Authority was \$10,400.

The Authority has no controlled entities.

There have been no departures from the provisions of the Subordinate Legislation Act. No extensions have been sought under that Act.

By virtue of section 6(a) of the Election Funding Act 1981 the Electoral Commissioner is appointed Chairperson of the Election Funding Authority.

The Electoral Commissioner is appointed by the Governor pursuant to section 21A of the Parliamentary Electorates and Elections Act 1912 and his functions relating to that Act are set out in the annual report of the State Electoral Office.

The Authority administers the public funding of Parliamentary election campaigns and ensures the disclosure of political contributions and electoral expenditure by parties, groups, candidates and third parties.

During the reporting period:-

- the Authority prepared and distributed instructional material to parties, groups and candidates contesting the 2004 Local Government General Election;
- processed the claims for payment and disclosure of political contributions and electoral expenditure by parties, groups and candidates at 2003 NSW State General Election;
- administered the Political Education Fund established to provide money to eligible parties for expenditure on political education; and
- ensured that third parties disclosed expenditure incurred in relation to the electoral process in the State election.

The Authority, under the Chairperson, undertook all these matters together with others outlined in this Report.

PRIVACY MANAGEMENT PLAN

Pursuant to the provisions of the Election Funding Act 1981 all documents lodged with the Authority must be made available for public inspection.

The details of the Privacy Management Plan generally are set out in the Annual Report of the State Electoral Office.

PROMOTION

The Authority publishes instructional handbooks for use by parties, groups and candidates contesting State and Local Government elections.
